RECYCLE RIGHT

Plastic is recycled by sorting items into specific types that are bailed and sold to manufacturers who process it into new products. Recycling the various types of plastic is dependent on two things:

Recyclability - whether the type of plastic can be reprocessed into a reusable material

Marketability - whether manufacturers can reprocess it economically into a product to sell

Currently in Skagit County

Curbside recycling accepts clean plastic **bottles, jars, jugs, and dairy tubs**.

Transfer station recycling drop-off accepts clean plastic **bottles and jugs, but NOT jars or tubs**.

Just remember the **SHAPE** of the container is what's important, not the number in the triangle



RECYCLE RIGHT IN SKAGIT COUNTY

Keep informed about what shapes of plastic items you can and cannot recycle. Guidelines can change as new recycling methods and manufacturers enter the marketplace.
